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Session Title

Competitive Advantage of Regions: Comparative Studies on Industries

Abstract

In recovering from the current financial and economic crisis clusters of industry are often seen as a resilient and sustainable platform for future growth. Industry clusters have generated an extraordinary amount of interest in contemporary debates on regional economic development theory and praxis across a wide range of academic disciplines and policy circles. These debates gained momentum in view of the greater influence that global competition has on regional and national economies (e.g. Porter 2000). From the review of industry cluster and agglomeration studies, it is clear that there exists an abundance of theoretical concepts, most of which mainly attempt to disentangle the fundamental reasons behind geographical concentration of economic activities. Even though concepts such as natural advantage have been used to explain the fundamental reasons for industrial agglomeration in earlier theories, recent literature has been characterized by a socially, politically and culturally oriented analysis of localization economies.

The session Competitive Advantage of Regions will focus on the international division of labour in East Asia and Europe, the alterations that took place during the 20th century and the role of industry clusters. The session shall utilize industry as its unit of analysis, by which it shall review how the unique 'regional' conditions are interrelated to the formation of industries and its dynamics. Both theoretical oriented papers and case studies will contribute to a discussion on the role of firms and industries in regional economic development processes. This session can be seen as a starting point of a planned long-term joint international research project of East-Asian and European business historians.
